# ASP Certification Deadline

There are only **65 days** left to certify that your agency has met PTASP regulation requirements in the <u>Transit Award Management System</u> (TrAMS) to meet the **December 31**, **2020** deadline.

Recipients that have not completed the PTASP certification by December 31, 2020, will be ineligible to receive FTA funds until the certification is complete.





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# Q & A Highlights

#### Question 1:

Can the Chief Safety Officer (CSO) be an employee of a contracted service provider?

#### **FTA Response:**

Yes, the CSO can be an employee of the contractor as long as the transit agency ensures the contractor CSO meets the requirements for the role set forth in § 673.5 and § 673.23(d)(2). This includes that the CSO must have a line of reporting to the Accountable Executive that is direct and uninterrupted.

#### Question 2:

May an authorized external service provider (ESP) employee serve in the role of the Accountable Executive, rather than a transit agency employee?

#### **FTA Response:**

If an ESP employee has control or direction over the human and capital resources needed to develop and maintain both the Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan and ASP, and fulfills other requirements of the role, then this ESP employee can be designated as the Accountable Executive. #### Incorporating Contractors into the ASP

Describe necessary authorities, accountabilities, and responsibilities for agency employees and contractors to carry out the ASP.

Consider specifying which employees and/or contractors are considered "directly responsible" for safety.

Accountable Executive may be designated; each ESP supporting the agency cannot have its own Accountable Executive.

#### **Question 3:**

If our transit agency contracts out for all of our transit delivery services and doesn't have control over the management of contractor employees, do we still need to address the Safety Promotion component of the ASP?

#### **FTA Response:**

Yes, even if a transit agency contracts out for all of its services and does not have direct control over hiring, training, or firing of contractor employees, the agency must still address the Safety Promotion component in its ASP.





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The **training section** should describe or reference documentation that describes the contractor's safety training programs for those contractor employees directly responsible for safety.

The **communication section** should describe or reference documentation that describes how the contractor communicates safety and safety performance information throughout its organization and to the transit agency.

It may be beneficial for the agency to collaborate with the contractor when developing this section of its ASP.

#### **Question 4:**

Our agency contracts our bus and paratransit service operations and maintenance to a contractor, and that contractor has an existing System Safety Program Plan (SSPP). Since our

agency is the recipient of the FTA funds (not the contractor), can the contractor keep their existing SSPP, and can our new ASP cite or reference sections of the contractor's SSPP?

#### **FTA Response:**

Yes, a recipient's ASP may cite or reference sections of its contracted service provider's SSPP as they apply to the agency's Safety Management System processes, and satisfy PTASP regulation requirements.
