Q & A Highlights

Question 1:

What types of incidents are intended to be tracked and monitored by the ASP? Should the agency be reviewing events such as vehicle accidents, thefts, and potential terror attacks?

FTA Response:

The PTASP regulation defines an event (<u>§ 673.5</u>) as any <u>accident</u>, <u>incident</u>, or <u>occurrence</u>. For the safety event performance measure, FTA uses all safety events that meet a National Transit Database (NTD) major event reporting threshold. The NTD defines a safety event as a collision, derailment, fire, hazardous material spill, an act of nature (Act of God), evacuation, or other safety occurrence not otherwise classified occurring on transit right-ofway, in a transit revenue facility, in a transit maintenance facility, or involving a transit revenue vehicle and meeting established NTD thresholds.

Additionally, investigations of accidents and other events may be valuable sources of information for identifying hazards and supporting your Safety Risk Assessment process.

Question 2:

The FTA document titled <u>PTASP Checklist for Bus Transit</u> states, in section 5, that Safety Hazard Identification is supposed to include "data and information provided by FTA as sources for hazard identification." Do you know where I can find this FTA data?

FTA Response:

A transit agency "must consider, as a source for hazard identification, data and information provided by an oversight authority and the FTA" (§ 673.25(b)(2)). This may include updates to the <u>National Public Transportation Safety Plan</u>, <u>safety advisories</u>, <u>safety bulletins</u>, <u>special</u> and <u>general</u> directives, or reports. You can sign up to receive safety information from FTA through <u>GovDelivery</u>.

Question 3:

Do we need to list all of our agency's hazards and Safety Risk Assessment activities in the Safety Risk Management section of the ASP?

FTA Response:

The ASP must document your agency's hazard **sources** and hazard identification **process**, as well as the processes you use to assess safety risk and create safety risk mitigations. There is no requirement to document specific hazards or safety assessments within the ASP. However, your agency must keep records of the results of all its Safety Hazard Identification, Safety Risk Assessment, and Safety Risk Mitigation activities.





ASP Lessons Learned: Hazard Identification

 Describe the methods or processes used to identify hazards and consequences of hazards and note the relevant authorities, accountabilities, and responsibilities of key positions.

- Consider referencing a separate document with details on methods and processes and/or consider describing how the agency carries out Safety Hazard Identification.
- For example, identify responsible parties and describe data management, identification frequency, and key outputs.
- Include FTA and other oversight authorities as a source of hazard information.
- Consider specifying that employees, contractors, and the public may also be sources of hazard information.
- Consider describing the protocols the agency uses to immediately address hazards that pose an imminent threat to the safety of persons or property.
- Consider describing how the agency will select or prioritize hazards and potential consequences to undergo Safety Risk Assessment.
