Q & A Highlights

Question 1:

What is the best way to monitor contractors to ensure they are properly implementing our ASP?

FTA Response:

Contractors are accountable to your transit agency based on the terms of your formal agreement(s) with them. Your agency may choose to update its formal agreements with its contractors to include relevant ASP activities if the agreements do not already include them. FTA has <u>not</u> published guidance, such as a checklist, for monitoring contracted providers;

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it is ultimately up to your agency to determine the best approach. However, some examples of contractor oversight may include:

- Reviewing the documented results of their safety risk management activities.
- Reviewing documentation of their safety training curriculum, completed safety training, and safety communication efforts.
- Monitoring safety performance and safety risk mitigation activities.
- Analyzing safety event investigations and causal factors.
- Monitoring contractor activities in real time, such as performance of a safety risk assessment.

FTA Response:

The oversight review teams may ask PTASP-related questions during the Triennial Review. However, FTA will not issue findings related to the PTASP regulation until after July 20, 2021, per the <u>Notice of Enforcement Discretion</u> published on December 11, 2020.

FTA is in the process of developing its Triennial Review checklist. FTA will share its PTASP oversight review expectations through the <u>Comprehensive Review Contractor's Manual</u>.

Question 3:

Is it required for the City Council to approve the ASP, or would the City Manager be sufficient?

FTA Response:

Per <u>49 CFR § 673.11(a)(1)</u>, the ASP and subsequent updates must be signed by the Accountable Executive and approved by the agency's Board of Directors or an Equivalent Authority. An Equivalent Authority is an entity that carries out duties similar to that of a Board of Directors, including sufficient authority to review and approve the ASP. An Equivalent Authority could be the city council or city manager for a city or the county legislature for a county. Given the varying sizes and organizational structures of the many recipients and subrecipients throughout the country, FTA does not provide a prescriptive definition of the term Equivalent Authority.
