#### Question 1:

Do you have any suggestions on ensuring sufficiency of operations and maintenance procedures? Should this review solely be focused on desk reviews of reports or should it include physical observations of operations and maintenance procedures?

# ASP Implementation Workshop Replay

### **FTA Response:**

You can use several different methods to monitor the sufficiency of your procedures. You can review data and completed inspection reports. Reviews could also involve other activities, such as field observations, interviews with employees and managers, and review of training materials and records. For example, an agency may determine that the current routine bus brake-inspection process is insufficient after reviewing reports of brake failures and employee safety reports from operators. These reports may highlight issues with braking performance related to how maintenance technicians diagnose and resolve bus brake problems. The agency also could discover this issue through supervisory observations of maintenance technicians' bus brake inspections. Workshops with employees and managers could help identify issues and challenges with inspection procedures and collect information that may be used to develop a solution.

### Question 2:

How should our agency monitor compliance and sufficiency with pre-trip inspections?

#### FTA Response:

The PTASP regulation requires transit agencies to monitor their system for compliance with, and sufficiency of, the agency's operations and maintenance procedures (§ 673.27(b)(1)) but gives agencies flexibility to decide which activities work best for their operations.

For pre-trip inspections, examples of compliance monitoring activities include:

- Periodic observations of pre-trip inspections by supervisors, safety department representatives, or other qualified personnel;
- Desk audits of pre-trip inspection records;
- Observing pre-trip inspection training; and
- Interviewing operators on how they conduct pre-trip inspections.

Examples of activities to monitor the sufficiency of pre-trip inspection procedures include:

- Desk audits of vehicle failure reports and maintenance requests; and
- Interviews of mechanics and operators on common mechanical issues they have experienced.

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
