Key Considerations for Proposed Changes



Incorporate statutory changes in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law



Reinforce the use of Safety Management Systems (SMS) in transit agencies



Coordinate and align with other FTA programs and forthcoming safety rulemakings



Large Urbanized Area Providers

- Safety Committee
- Safety risk reduction program
- Safety Performance Targets for safety risk reduction program
- Safety training for maintenance employees

Small Urbanized Area Providers

 Cooperation with frontline transit worker representatives on Agency Safety Plan development

Proposed Changes to PTASP

Rail Transit Agencies

- Clarification of PTASP applicability

Updated Definition



Applicability and General Requirements

Include Safety risk reduction program in the Agency Safety Plan (ASP)

Incorporate Roadway Worker Protection (RWP) policies in the ASP

Incorporate agency policies regarding SSOA Risk-Based Inspection Program in the ASP

Clarify applicability to 5307 recipients and all rail transit agencies, and clarify that initial PTASP certification must occur prior to the start of operations

Clarify State role in ASP development; delete old certification deadlines and remove reference to System Safety Program Plan

Revise ASP Approval Requirement to include Safety Committee prior to Board of Directors or Equivalent entity

Clarify that safety performance targets (SPTs) must be set annually, and SPTs for the safety risk reduction program are required only for large urbanized area providers

Safety Risk Reduction Program

Transit agency must use Safety Risk Management (SRM) and Safety Assurance (SA) processes to mitigate, monitor safety performance, and address deficiencies

Transit agency must consider certain mitigations for risk relating to assaults on transit workers, and risk relating to vehicular and pedestrian safety events for "transit vehicles" (expanded from statutory requirement for "buses")

Based on Safety Risk Assessment, when Safety Committee recommends to Accountable Executive measures to reduce injuries to transit workers and assault on transit workers, the transit agency must implement one or more of the mitigations, unless the Accountable Executive determines it would not improve the agency's overall safety performance.

Safety Committee sets safety risk reduction program safety performance targets (SPT)





Safety Management Policy

Safety Committee Authorities, Accountabilities, and Responsibilities

Add the Safety Committee or approach to cooperation with frontline transit worker representatives to the Agency's Safety Management Policy

Add consideration of Safety Committee recommendations to the Accountable Executive responsibilities

Add transit worker assaults, near-misses, and unsafe acts and conditions to employee safety reporting program as examples of safety concerns





Safety Risk Management Safety Assurance

Add CDC, State health authorities, oversight authorities, and FTA as sources for safety risk mitigation

Add CDC, State health authorities to list of sources for hazard identification

Add safety concerns identified through Safety Assurance activities to list of sources for hazard identification Require annual assessment of safety performance through continuous improvement

practices

Specify that safety performance assessment includes identification of deficiencies in the agency's SMS and safety performance through safety performance target monitoring

Revise language for plan to address deficiencies identified in safety performance assessments

Extend continuous improvement to small public transportation providers







Safety Promotion

Specify requirements for all transit workers in the comprehensive safety training program

Add de-escalation training to safety training program

Include maintenance workers in safety training program for large urbanized area providers

Add safety concern identification and reporting training


Add safety information from cooperation with frontline transit worker representatives or Safety Committees to safety communication requirements






Roadway Worker Protection (RWP)

- PTASP NPRM requires rail transit agencies to include or incorporate by reference in their Agency Safety Plans policies and procedures regarding rail transit workers on the roadway
- This requirement relates to FTA's forthcoming RWP proposed rule (49 CFR part 671)
- RWP requirements are responsive to National Transportation Safety Board recommendations



Risk-Based Inspection

- The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law requires State Safety Oversight Agency (SSOA) risk-based inspection programs at 49 U.S.C. 5329(k)
- PTASP NPRM proposes to incorporate the requirement that rail transit agencies include or incorporate by reference in their Agency Safety Plans the policies and procedures to provide access to facilities and required data as part of SSOA risk-based inspection programs



Confidential Reporting

- The PTASP NPRM does not propose any new requirements related to transit worker safety reporting programs
- FTA is interested in hearing from the transit industry and other interested stakeholders regarding any experience establishing or participating in confidential reporting methods for transit workers
- NPRM requests feedback regarding establishing confidential reporting methods for transit workers
