2019 TAM Roundtable - Bus Operators: A <u>draft agenda</u> is now available for the second 2019 TAM Roundtable event on **September 4-5** in St. Louis, Missouri. This <u>1.5-day event</u> is designed for smaller tier I and tier II agencies that do not operate rail and will focus on more fundamental issues related to TAM implementation.

California's GCTD opens new operations, maintenance facility: Gold Coast Transit District in Ventura County opened a <u>new facility</u> to replace an outdated and deteriorating bus garage and office space originally built in the 1970s for a much smaller fleet.

Chicago remade its 127-year-old rapid transit system. Are there lessons for Metro?: Chicago's "L" system was able to bounce back from a \$10 billion maintenance backlog through years of focused investment, offering some lessons for the future of D.C.'s Metro system.

Maryland Transit Administration forecasts \$2 billion shortfall over next decade: The MTA 's first Capital Needs Inventory identified \$5.7 billion in necessary spending between now and 2028, including \$1.5 billion to bring the agency's assets back to a state of good repair.

Quincy commuters cheer reopening of MBTA's Wollaston Station: The MBTA Wollaston Station <u>reopened</u> after more than a year and a half of renovations. The \$36 million overhaul brought the station in line with new standards for safety, flooding, and other requirements such as accessibility.
