Upcoming Webinars

TAM Internal Coordination Webinar: FTA will host a <u>webinar</u> on November 30, 2017, from 2-3 PM ET to review how two different agencies approach internal coordination of staff to support TAM efforts. The webinar will feature presentations from the Jacksonville Transportation Authority and Maryland Transit Administration, and will highlight how each agency supports TAM through staff coordination and has gained support for TAM from their executives and boards.

FHWA TAM Process Improvements Webinar: FHWA and AASHTO will host a <u>webinar</u> on December 13, 2017, from 2-3:30 PM ET. The webinar is focused on understanding FHWA requirements that guide (highway) TAM Plan development, and addresses process improvements.

Calif.
