Message from the Associate Administrator

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Dear Transit Colleagues,

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) seeks to improve every facet of transit safety through innovation. To support innovative development of technologies and grow small businesses, FTA participates in the Small Business Innovation Research Program (SBIR). Across the US Department of Transportation, all modes, including FTA, set-aside a portion of their research budget for SBIR grants. Phase I grants are typically \$150,000, and are given to develop a solution through a specific solicitation by FTA. Phase II grants are follow-on awards, up to \$750,000, given when a SBIR grantee achieves success in Phase I - including showing how they will effectively develop and market their solution.

FTA is currently funding three SBIR projects: a pedestrian and cyclist detection device for transit buses, an automated

passenger counting and re-identification system for transit buses with potential to be used in large public facilities such as subway and train stations, and automated multi-pedestrian warning sensors to alert transit bus drivers about pedestrian volume at intersections.

This spring, we will highlight some of FTA's innovative safety research projects in our newsletter. Please keep an eye out for these stories in the coming months, and as always, we welcome your feedback at <u>FTASafetyStakeholder@dot.gov</u>.

I also want to remind readers of the upcoming deadlines for State Safety Oversight (SSO) program certification. With the deadline nearly one year away, it is very important that states have submitted their applications to FTA by April 15, 2018 or no later than September 30, 2018 after which states should not assume a certification decision can be made by the April 15, 2019 deadline. The <u>certification status table</u> has updates on each state's progress. We are working diligently to ensure that all SSO Agencies are advancing through the application process to be certified by the April 15, 2019 deadline.

Thank you for working with us to keep public transit safe.

FTA Issues Two-Hour Accident Notification Guide

The State Safety Oversight (SSO) rule at 49 CFR. Part 674 requires rail transit agencies (RTAs) to notify their SSO Agencies (SSOAs) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) within two hours of any accident occurring on a rail

fixed guideway public transportation system.

The <u>Two-Hour Accident Notification Guide</u> and <u>Two-Hour Accident Notification Quick Reference</u> <u>Checklist</u> provide guidance to RTAs on identifying accidents that require two-hour notification and how to notify FTA. The guidance documents can also be found by visiting <u>FTA's SSO Program</u> <u>website</u>.

Please note, an RTA must provide the two-hour accident notification to FTA required under Part 674 once its SSO Program is certified by FTA or after April 15, 2019, whichever occurs first. Until a state's SSO Program is certified, an RTA must only



continue to provide two-hour notifications to its SSOA as required by 49 CFR Part 659.

How do I notify FTA of an accident?

Contact the U.S. Department of Transportation Crisis Management Center (CMC) within two hours of a reportable accident, by email (recommended method) or phone: <u>CMC-01@dot.gov</u> or (202) 366-1863.

When providing two-hour notifications, please submit accident information details as specified by your SSOA's program standard. SSO-required notifications may include, but are not limited to, a summary of the event and pertinent details such as the number of fatalities, the number of serious injuries (including type of injury if known) and primary and secondary event types (e.g. collision, derailment, fire, etc.).
