



The Definition of Safety Culture




The U.S. Department of Transportation Safety Council's definition of Safety Culture:


The shared values, actions, and behaviors that demonstrate a commitment to safety over competing goals and demands.

Safety Benefits of SMS Implementation

Example Programs	Safety Outcomes
Participative Safety Rules Revision	30% reduction in reportable injuries Drop in liability claims
Root-Cause Analysis Problem Solving (ISROP)	50% drop in injury rates (all injuries)
Clear Signal for Action (CSA) • Peer-to-Peer Feedback • Continuous Improvement • Safety Leadership	76% drop in injury rates 71% drop in reportable injuries
	79% drop in L.E. decertification rates 81% drop in derailments 65% drop in yard-derailment rates
Confidential Close Call Reporting System (C³RS)	31% reduction in derailments at 1 site 90% drop in discipline cases


