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# Q & A Highlights

#### **Question 1:**

In a multimodal system with rail and bus, can the Chief Safety Officer oversee safety for BOTH rail and bus?

#### **FTA Response:**

Yes, the Chief Safety Officer (CSO) can oversee both rail and bus modes and may be described as such in the Agency Safety Plan, wherever the authorities, accountabilities, and responsibilities are defined. To the extent that the Safety Management System (SMS) covers each mode operated by a multimodal agency, the CSO is responsible for the operation of that SMS.

#### Question 2:

Our transit agency is considered a large bus operator. (We operate more than 100 revenue buses during rush-hour.) In the development of our Agency Safety Plan, does the FTA also require we take our Paratransit/On-Demand services into consideration, too? Kindly advise.

#### **FTA Response:**

Yes, as a recipient of section 5307 funds, your agency must establish an ASP for its entire operation. (49 C.F.R. § 673.1.) Your agency may draft one ASP for each mode (bus, paratransit/on-demand) or one ASP that addresses all transit modes. (49 C.F.R. § 673.11(b))

#### **Question 3:**

The "Public Transportation Agency Safety Plan Checklist for Bus Transit," Section 5, checkbox 1 states that safety hazard identification sources include data and information provided by FTA. Do you know where I can find this FTA data?

#### **FTA Response:**

Pursuant to 49 C.F.R. § 673.25(b)(2), a transit agency "must consider, as a source for hazard identification, data and information provided by an oversight authority and the FTA." This may include updates to the National Public Transportation Safety Plan, safety advisories, safety bulletins, special and general directives, or reports.
